Easter Reflection

If you are old enough, like me, you might remember a TV show called Tales of the Unexpected. It aired back in the 1980s and was based on short stories by the author Roald Dahl. Each story had a surprise in it, an odd twist that earned the name 'tales of the unexpected'.

Perhaps you feel like you are living in a tale of the unexpected at the moment? Everything around us seems strange and peculiar, like pictures of deserted London streets, the silence of hardly any planes going overhead, or the sight of shops and restaurants closed indefinitely. This is not what anyone expected at the start of the year.

And how about us personally? What is our expectation about life and all it involves? Perhaps that has been shaken up by job insecurity, economic uncertainty and worries about health for ourselves or those we love. What about our expectations for today? Normally we might have gathered with friends or family, and that is not an option in today's climate. Maybe you had given up something for lent, with the expectation of ending that fast today. I guess many of us might have broken the fast already with everything else going on. We would usually meet together as a church family to celebrate the wonder of Easter in joyful worship. Now we meet together, but scattered in different places in our homes. It is an Easter that nobody expected.

But you know, that can be quite helpful. Because it reminds us that Easter is all about confounding our expectations. Take Luke's account of that first Easter Sunday for example. The women who followed Jesus went to visit the tomb the first moment they could, once the sabbath had ended and Sunday had arrived. They expected to see a Roman guard preventing entrance to Jesus' tomb. They expected to see an enormous stone rolled across the door of the tomb, blocking entry. They expected to find Jesus' body inside. They expected to weep. They expected to mourn.

But Easter overturns their expectations. Instead of a stone blocking their entrance, they find the stone rolled away and the tomb open. Instead of Jesus' body they find an empty tomb with no body to be found. Instead of a Roman guard they find two men in brilliant white, angels, waiting to give them the good news. Instead of sadness they find joy. Instead of tears they find gladness. Instead of mourning they encounter joy.

Easter confounds our expectations, it overthrows our ideas and it changes our outlook. Dead people do not rise from the dead. The women who went to the tomb knew that. The disciples they told knew that. We know that. But Jesus rose from the dead on Easter Sunday. The tomb was empty. The tomb is still empty. Our expectations are thrown out of the window and Easter light shines into its place.

Easter is a tale of the unexpected. It is a story of things turned upside down. It is a joyful message of a situation far from normal. It's very wonder comes from its very oddness. If we find this Easter different and unexpected then perhaps God will use it to wake us up to our unexpected faith. We are people of the unexpected. We are followers of an unusual saviour. We are friends of a strange and peculiar king.

In fact, Easter is utterly unexpected to everyone except one – Jesus himself. This was not a surprise victory or unexpected event. It was his plan all along.

When the angels announce the good news to the women, they declare "He is not here; he has risen!" And they follow that with the words, "Remember how he told you..."

Easter is utterly unexpected and utterly expected. It was the planned victory of Jesus over death that broke the normal course of death and life. What seems so surprising was no surprise at all to the one who planned it all along.

So where does that leave us on this strange Easter Sunday? I say, let's embrace the strange! We are a strange people who follow a strange and wonderful saviour. We have a strange and unexpected message, that death is not the end, that death has been defeated, that death need no longer be an enemy. That is strange news and strange to the ears of those around us. But it is good strange, it is wonderful strange, it is amazing, life-changing, transformational news that is strange and surprising.

We live in strange times. Can we live out the strangeness of our faith in the strangeness of our times? There are lots of ways we could do that, but here is just one. We live in a world of fear at the moment. Fear of catching a virus, fear of losing our jobs, fear of how long things will last and, above all, fear of death. Recent

weeks have revealed our fragility and vulnerability as human beings. When we thought we might be invincible the world has been brought to its knees and brought to a standstill.

As Easter people with a strange and surprising faith, we need not be afraid. We need to be careful and protect ourselves and others, but we need not be afraid. Because we have a saviour who has been through death and conquered death for us. Death need not hold fear for those who are in Christ. That is a strange message for a world gripped by fear. But it is a powerful and positive and vital message for today. Will we pray to be so gripped by our surprising faith instead of fear, that we proclaim that message in word and deed to a needy world? Let's pray for that now.

Affirmation of Faith

Let us declare our faith in the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures; he was buried; he was raised to life on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures; afterwards he appeared to his followers, and to all the apostles: this we have received, and this we believe. Amen.
